#### From the Desk of Superintendent, Jeremy Boldra

I believe that one of the greatest things we've lost as people, as a society, is the ability to dream. Our technology has put everything at our fingertips, and we don't spend much time in thought.

When I began to think about becoming an administrator, I dreamt of leading a district to a Culture of Excellence. I didn't want to inherit excellence, but rather to build to a culture of excellence. I had experienced administrators who ruled with authority as a teacher, but I believed that I could lead in a different way...from the heart with care, empathy, and a common goal of doing what's best for kids. Because there was a culture of strength in the school community when I arrived, I believe that we were able to lay the groundwork in building a Culture of Excellence over the last seven years. I intentionally use the word "we" because no one does this alone. It takes committed and dedicated staff, a supportive community and board, and visionary leadership and goals to achieve so much with fidelity. Below is a short list of recent accomplishments that quickly came to my mind as things I could point to that demonstrated the Culture of Excellence that is being built to stand the test of time in Flinthills.

Gavin Girty just won a State Championship in Wrestling; Riggin Carney and Savannah McCreight won full ride scholarships to Wichita State and Emporia State respectively; the middle school boys basketball team went undefeated winning league and the girls had done it the year before; Forensics has placed 3<sup>rd</sup> or better at State the last three competition years with individual State Champions and placers; Volleyball has gone to State three out of the last seven years; girls' basketball got their first trip to State last year; TSA has had two state Champions in the last six years with multiple state placers; our music program has become competitive again with very qualified individuals; our FFA program is back competing again; we have been represented by a Kansas Teacher of the Year nominee five of the last seven years; we are implementing MTSS reading, math, and social-emotional learning district-wide; we have launched our school redesign initiative; we started a PreK program that ensures Kindergarten readiness; and we have completed many projects which were part of an Emergency Performance Contract in 2017 and a bond passed in 2019.

Again, the list is not fully inclusive of what we have accomplished over the last seven years, but all of these things aren't accomplished without the communication, collaboration, dedication, hard work, and grit of a school community called Flinthills and my dream to build a Culture of Excellence with them. I am especially proud of what has been accomplished, and I challenge you to continue to dream and build upon the Flinthills Culture of Excellence moving forward.

### FFA Busy and Successful


Flinthills FFA has been active over the past several weeks.

## **Undefeated League Champs 16-0!!!!!**

The Flinthills Middle School Boys' Basketball team finished the season undefeated and claimed the South Central Border League championship with an exciting 34-30 overtime victory win over Cedar Vale / Dexter Middle School in Caldwell, KS.

This season, the Mustangs outscored their opponents by an average of 45-17, and finished with an overall record of 16-0. This marks the first time since 2016 that the Mustang boys have won a championship. This also marks, the first undefeated season since joining the SCBL in 2010.

An undefeated season is no easy accomplishment. It requires discipline, on and off the court, effort, energy, focus, and an unwavering attention to detail. It also takes a team committed to unselfish play and teamwork. This team exemplified all these traits both on and off the court.

These traits were on full display during the championship game as we trailed at half-time 11-17. It is typical for teams that struggle for a half of basketball to waver in the confidence and start making excuses. But not this team. The half-time locker room was focused and determined. They never wavered in the confidence and in each other. The coaches had confidence going into the second half that this team would overcome the deficit and play inspired basketball.

Baseball legend Yogi Berra once coined the phrase in 1973: "It ain't over till it's over." The Mustang boys can certainly agree with this phrase. Having trailed the entire game until the last few minutes of regulation when we tied the game and set the game to overtime. During the overtime season we battled back and forth until we turned up the defense and made two late baskets to tie the game and go ahead by 2. In the final seconds, we put the game away with two key free throws. What a great game!

This year's boys' basketball teams were a blessing to coach. Coach Kemp and myself believe that these young men have a lot of potential. We are excited to see these young men grow into good basketball players but more importantly grow into good young men of integrity and character. 
## High School Girls Have Thrilling Season


