## Boy, It's Hot Outside:

In spite of knowing that we are in Kansas and that summers are traditionally hot, this year has seen numerous heat records broken both locally and around the state. As a matter of fact, we have had many days classified as extreme heat.

Extreme heat is defined as a period of high heat and humidity with temperatures above 90 degrees for at least two to three days. KSHSAA (Kansas State High School Activities Association) has an established Heat Policy for schools to follow to keep our children safe when we are in extreme heat. It can be found in detail by going to www.kshsaa.org and clicking on the link to Heat Policy.

This policy breaks down safety expectations for activities when the heat is 80 degrees or hotter. As some of you know, we have delayed some outdoor games for an hour or two until it has cooled off; that's following the KSHSAA guidelines.
Our Middle School and High School football teams spent those 100+ days practicing indoors and only moved outside for practice or games when the heat index was low enough to be safe. During the scorching heat, coolers with ice water were placed on each bus and towels in Ziplock bags to put in the water incase someone starts to overheat. Vehicles were also used to take students home that live the furthest away and to shorten the route for the other students.

When we feel like complaining about the heat, try to imagine what life was like in 1936 which is the hottest summer on record for Kansas. In July, 1936, Alton and Fredonia each registered a record temperature of 121 degrees. Wichita had 20 consecutive days of 100+ degree temperatures with the highest at 114.

In 1980, one "cool" day of 98 interrupted what would have been a record-setting 27 days of 100+ degrees for Wichita. In 2011, Wichita experienced
 53 days of 100+ temperatures throughout the year.
This year, Wichita had 10 days that reached triple digits in August with the highest at 111 degrees.

It appears we are moving into Fall with lower temperatures, but the Flinthills administration will continue to follow KSHSAA guidelines for weather. If the heat returns, check with the school for delays or rescheduled events.

## From the Desk of Superintendent Brian Spencer

It is exciting to be a Flinthills Mustang - AGAIN! I started working in July and have sent out a couple of phone calls on the calling system, so it is very likely that everyone in the district is aware that I am the Interim Superintendent this year.

I served the Flinthills District from 1986 to 1998 as an English, Social Studies, and Speech \& Drama teacher. I also directed the plays and coached football, track and forensics. It was a great time for my family and I. One of the best parts of returning has been rekindling relationships from 25 years ago. What a pleasure it has been to see those who were students back then being the ones in charge and making a difference in the district now! Just like I have had to make a shift in my head to ad-

This is my 22 nd year as a superintendent. When I left Flinthills at the end of the 19971998 school year, we moved to Miltonvale in the Southern Cloud County District where I was the K-12 principal. I became the Superintendent for that district for the 2001-2002 school year and remained there until July of 2004 when we moved to Lyndon, where my wife Angela and I still live. I was the Superintendent at Lyndon from until the end of the 20162017 school year. I left that district to become the superintendent at Central Heights USD \#288, I retired from there in July of 2020. I didn't work in education during the 2020-2021 year, but came out of retirement in July of 2021 to serve as the interim superintendent for Rozel - Pawnee Heights, USD \#496 for two years. When I became aware that Flinthills was searching for an interim Superintendent I thought serving there would be a great way to finish my career. Flinthills has always been a great district with great people, and the chance to return here and give back to a district that gave me a great start to a long career was intriguing.

After meeting with the board and talking with Angela, we agreed this would be a mutually beneficial situation for everyone involved. So far, that has been the situation. As I mentioned it has been fun to reconnect with people. Although I don't always recognize everyone initially, it seldom takes long once the conversation begins. There has been some fear from some of you former students that I will tell stories about you to your kids. Don't worry, your secrets are safe with me as long as you will do me the same favor!

My how the summer flew by fast. Hope everyone had a good and safe one. Now back to the grind for a great school year.

Just some reminders and info that I want to share with everyone.
As many of you have heard and read about, opioid overdose is a rising concern for everyone. Fentanyl is our big concern, but there are many other meds that are in the opioid group. I can provide you with a list, if you are interested. On April 1st, I went to a town hall meeting in El Dorado that addressed this issue. It was very informative and if they have another one, I would highly recommend you attend. While there I was able to speak with the DCCCA foundation and was able to receive Narcan for free, which is the drug that reverses an opioid overdose. During our staff development days, I arranged for a representative to come and train the majority of the staff on the symptoms of an opioid overdose and the subsequent treatment. We pray that we never have to deal with this, but at least if we do, we are prepared.

So much info is given to you parents at the beginning of school, but I want to point out some changes in the handbook. I just want to remind you in regards to illness: No student will be allowed to attend or stay at school with a temp of 100 degrees. They must be fever free for 24 hours without fever reducing medication. A student with a strep infection must be on antibiotics for a full 12 hours before returning to school and fever free for 24 hours without fever reducing medication. Any child with vomiting or diarrhea may return to school after being symptom free for 24 hours. Also, if a child is taking medication here at the school, I must have a signed form from the doctor and the parent giving me or my designee permission to administer the medication. And if the child has emergency meds such as an inhaler or epi-pen and they are going to self administer, I also need a form for this signed by the doctor and parent. I have these forms in my office.

Will my child always be in the program?
No. We work closely with the classroom teacher to monitor student progress. When a student's reading or math achievement reaches their appropriate grade level, the student is dropped from the program if the Title I teacher and classroom teacher feel the student no longer needs the extra support.

## How does Title I benefit my child?

The Title I teacher provides intensive, individualized instruction to students who need it. As students experience success, they gain confidence in their abilities and their performance in the classroom improves.

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## Pink eye or Conjunctivitis

Pink eye or conjunctivitis is an extremely common and contagious childhood illness. There are 4 types of pinkeye.

1. Bacterial conjunctivitis-causes red, itchy and often painful eyes. It can affect one or both eyes and is often accompanied by yellowish discharge and mild swelling. May wake up with eyes closed shut with dried drainage. This type of pink eye usually requires antibiotic drops.
2. Viral conjunctivitis-causes pink, watery, itchy eyes, It may affect one of both eyes. It is sometimes difficult to determine whether a student has bacterial or viral pink eye.
3. Allergic conjunctivitis-causes itchy watery, pink eyes that tend to occur seasonal. It generally affects both eyes.
4. Irritant conjunctivitis-manifests as pink, watery eyes after contact with an eye irritant (such as sand or chlorine). It generally resolves quickly without treatment.

Viral is the most common form of pink eye and symptoms are generally mild and resolve without treatment. They are, however, contagious during the period the child has symptoms. The virus is spread via contact with eye discharge, either directly or by touching surfaces that have been in contact with the discharge.

If a child has been on antibiotic eye drops, they may return to school after 24 hours of treatment. If your child has symptoms with drainage, they need to remain at home until the symptoms subside, due to the fact that most young students do not practice frequent handwashing and the drainage can be easily spread.

If you are questioning which type of pink eye your student has and whether or not to keep them home, it is best to play on the safe side and keep them home.
