Stuco Food Drive Brings in Record Numbers

On November 16, Flinthills Student Council held a food drive for the middle and high school students. The intermediate food drive went from November 13 to November 17. Throughout the week items such as toothbrushes, toothpaste, deodorant, shampoo, bodywash, floss, and loofahs were collected as well.

The items donated went to local families, Sunlight Child Advocacy Center, and Family Life Center of Butler County. The students really stepped up this year with their donations and were able to bring together more items than any other Flinthills Stuco food drive in the past.

The intermediate brought in about 325 items, the middle school brought in about 300, and the high school brought in around 550 items. This brought the total amount of donations close to 1,200 items! As incentive we had any teacher that received 50+ items give students a day of nontraditional classes.

Mr. Hunter agreed to a pie in the face if we hit the goal. Amazingly, the entire High School and Middle School staff reached the goal as well as Mr. Hunter. We hope to keep donation numbers high throughout the next food drives as the donations this year really helped local families and local organizations. 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From the Desk of Superintendent, Brian Spencer

There are two words related to school and winter that elicit strong emotions from various people. The words are Snow Day! Calling a snow day is one of those situations where I am very likely to have a split decision on whether or not it was a good decision or not. Honestly, the decision is not made easily or taken lightly. There are repercussions to many people when the decision is made to cancel school.

As a youngster I can remember the mornings my siblings and I listened anxiously as the cancellation list was read, usually alphabetically, but sometimes by USD number, over the radio. The excitement or disappointment built as the list got closer to USD 358, Oxford. (I grew up in Oxford.) If the decision was made the evening before we would learn about the closing by watching it scroll across the bottom of the TV screen, and one of us would be kneeling in front of the TV flipping the channels (We didn't have remotes. We had to "flip" the dial.) back and forth between the three stations (Yes, there were only three stations to choose from: 3, 10 & 12.) hoping to see it as soon as possible!

Of course, things are different today. Schools can send out one message and notify every family at the same time with a phone call, text message, and an email. Students don't find out about closings from the radio or TV. They get notified directly. The grandparents are the ones that see the list on TV and learn who is or isn't having school. Although the ways of notification are different, the decision-making process is still very similar.

I have always told people I have to have one important thing before I consider calling a Snow Day, and that one thing is snow! With everyone's access to the internet and forecasts provided as far as 10 days out, there are some administrators willing to make the call prior to having snow on the ground. I don't usually do that. I am old fashioned enough I wait on snow to arrive prior to canceling school. Additionally, having snow is certainly not all it takes to get a day off: the way it comes, when it comes, how much wind there is, and the temperature all play a part in the decision-making process.

Those seem pretty evident, but there are some other factors that not everyone is aware of that need to be taken into account. Things like the experience of the bus drivers is considered. Is the person who shovels the walks sick? Will the county maintainer be out plowing or is it still broken down? There are many things to consider that most people don't know anything about.

Perhaps the biggest factor in the decision is how conversations with the neighboring district superintendents go. We talk to each other. We drive roads, talk to people in the district and do our own research, and then we call each other. I once talked to a fellow superintendent who was stuck in a snow drift! He canceled, and so did the neighboring districts after speaking with him. The pressure to cancel builds as other districts close. Nobody wants to be the only district either in or out of school. We work in teams. More than once I have heard superintendents say, "I will do what you do. If you cancel I will cancel."

Additionally, the first one is usually the easiest one to call. After the first one it is tougher to call another one for fear you may need that day later. Nobody wants to have school on a day that is not scheduled because we wasted a snow day in November! We have some time built into the calendar for snow days, but we might not have four or five days. That is all part of the decision.

We have already had one snow day. I obviously don't know if there will be a need for more snow days or not, but if there is, I don't take the decision lightly. We do want to make sure everyone is notified as soon as possible. If you do not receive the calls from the school, call your child's building office and let them know so we can get your number correct in the system. If you didn't get a call, text, or an email on Sunday, November 26 letting you know that school was canceled on Monday the 27, something is not correct in the sys-



tem. If you didn't get a call, I hope you saw it on Facebook or maybe on TV. However you heard about it, I would imagine when you announced it was a Snow Day at Flinthills, there were both cheers and boos! Some things never change!



Nurse's Health Zone

Let me start out by saying, before I publish any medical information in the flyer, I do a lot of research to give you the most updated information. Most of my information comes from my training, the CDC, KDHE, and NIH websites.

This month I am going to focus on immunizations. You have already received your student's immunization record from the school which is obtained from the KDHE website. It is a form that tells you what immunizations your student needs at this time or will need in the future. The information enclosed, also tells you what immunizations your child is <u>required</u> to have before they can enter school or a certain grade. When your student receives a vaccination, the facility where they get the vaccination, <u>must</u> enter it in the KDHE website. If the student has a medical or religious reason they cannot receive the vaccination, I must have this form filled out and in their file. For the medical exemption the doctor must sign this form. Kansas does not have a philosophical exemption.

Hearing and vision screenings have also been completed and you should have those results, if your student was tested. If you need financial assistance with an exam or glasses, please let me know because an individual has set up a trust for children to get an exam and/or glasses. An application will need to be completed to see if they qualify for this assistance. Dental exams will be done after the first of the year.

KANSAS GRADUATED LICENSE LAWS

AGE 14 INSTRUCTION PERMIT
((VALID FOR 1 YEAR)

Must be accompanied by a
licensed driver 21 or older with at
least 1 year of driving experience.

May not use wireless devices
except in an emergency.

AGE 15 RESTRICTED LICENSE ((VALID FOR 1 YEAR)

Must have had instruction permit for 1 year and have 25 hours of supervised driving. If applying before turning 16 must have also completed driver's education course. May drive solo between home and work or school, may drive elsewhere with a licensed adult. Must complete 25 more hours of supervised driving (10 at night). No non-sibling minor passengers allowed.

AGE 16 (with a RESTRICTED LICENSE)
For the first six months, may
drive anytime between 5 am and
9 pm r to and from school
activities or religious workship
services with one non-immediate
family member as a passenger.
May not use wireless devices
except in an emergency.

AGE 17 (FULL LICENSE
Must provide a signed affadavit
of parent or guardian, stating
applicant has completed at
least 50 hourss of adultsupervised driving, with at
least 10 of those hours being at
night.

Seatbelts Are For Everyone

Did You Know?

If a Law Enforcement Officers sees you with a cell phone you can lose your license until you are 17.

Cell Phone Use is PROHIBITED in a vehicle you are driving until the age of 17.

KANSAS GDL LAWS

At 14, you can get a FARM PERMIT if you live on a farm larger than 20 acres, work for a farm, and have parent/guardian permission.

The permist allows you to drive solo going to/from work, home and school (NO SCHOOL ACTIVITIES) via the most direct route. NO cell phone use is allowe except in an emergency.



KANSAS GDL LAWS

INSTRUCTION PERMIT (Valid for 1 year) and drive when accompanied by a licensed driver who is 21 or older with at least one year of driving experience in the front passenger seat.

No one besides the supervising driver is allowed in the front seat.

NO cell phone use is allowed except in an emergency.



Did You Know?

LEGALLY you can NOT have ANY PASSENGERS in your vehicle until you are 16 years old and have met the licensing requirement.



















Cassoday Boosters 4-H Club Fall Activities
