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Superintendent News

Facilities Improvement Measures

Over the past year, the Board of Education has been exploring some facilities needs with P-1 Group, Inc. Last year our school district was one of three selected to receive a <u>free</u> Facilities Master Plan completed by P-1 engineers. P-1 Group, Inc. specializes in K-12 facilities, and their process is to come into a district, review the buildings to identify areas in need of repair or updates that could be made to save money by reducing energy consumption, and then develop a Facilities Master Plan designed to address those needs. The value of this free service was almost \$15,000 for the size of our district. Much research was gathered including the cost of our utilities; staff, student, and Board input; the review of our facilities; and much more. The completed Facilities Master Plan indicated that we had some energy efficiency issues, some deterioration of old pipes and electrical wires and boxes, and some safety concerns, which led to an Investment Grade Audit. The Investment Grade Audit was an intense study that put real dollar figures to the cost of the exposed district needs. It was determined that much could be accomplished through a savings procurement loan. In other words, through some updating of facilities (mainly in lighting and HVAC) we could use the money saved in annual expenses and deferred maintenance to pay for the updates and more. The Board spent much time prioritizing needs and wants, and ultimately settled on the following scope of work for the Facility Improvement Measures:

- 1) Primary School (Cassoday)
 - a. Replace HVAC System (which will be controlled centrally)
 - b. Replace Flourescent Lighting with LED (which is more efficient, quieter, and comfortable)
 - c. Make Electrical Improvements and Repairs (Safety and Efficiency Issue)
 - d. Replace Galvanized Plumbing with Copper (due to corrosion and will result in cleaner drinking water)
- 2) Intermediate, Middle, High School (Rosalia)
 - a. Replace HVAC System (which will be controlled centrally)
 - b. Replace Flourescent Lighting with LED (which is more efficient, quieter, and comfortable)
 - c. Make Electrical Improvements and Repairs (Safety and Efficiency Issue)
 - d. Replace Kitchen Plumbing (Corrosion is leading to leaks, and will result in cleaner water.)
 - e. Replace Football Field Lights (Current poles have exceeded natural life, and service workers refuse maintenance)

Other wants were discussed, but ultimately the Board wanted to address needs first. Much of the work is general maintenance, and while you may not notice significant structural changes, we expect that your children will notice a significant improvement in their learning environment. For example, LED lighting should result in improved concentration, fewer headaches, and less noise, all while being cheaper to operate. The cost of this project will be \$2,117,225.63 divided out over twelve years, but it will be completed by the end of the current school year. The cost of the project will be paid through savings of current operations and maintenance costs and through Capital Outlay funds, and will not increase residents' property taxes. Most of the construction will be completed after school hours, on weekends and over holidays, and it should not negatively affect the children's learning environment. We are excited about this project and the lasting impact it will have on our district.

Bullying & Suicide Prevention

One of the new laws that was passed this last legislative session was that all school staff are required to complete suicide prevention training annually. This training is free and available to anyone at http://jasonfoundation.com/login/, and I would encourage everyone to take one or more courses. Not only does this site provide training on suicide prevention, but also bullying. Our entire staff completed the 2-hour course with 5 modules. Our staff also receives annual training geared towards bullying prevention. This has been offered in numerous ways. Our district has adopted policies in regards to bullying and suicide prevention.





It is an ideal way for people and communities to unite and take a visible stand against drugs. The campaign was started when drug traffickers in Mexico City murdered DEA agent Kiki Camarena in 1985. This began the continuing tradition of displaying Red Ribbons as a symbol of intolerance towards the use of drugs. The mission of the campaign is to present a unified and visible commitment towards the creation of a DRUG-FREE AMERICA! Students will learn about the impact of drugs and alcohol and will have the opportunity to sign a pledge making a commitment to living drug free. There will also be pledge forms sent home for parents, neighbors, community members, adult leaders, family members, etc. to fill out and send back to school. We will create a Wall of Pledges in the hall to show the commitment of Flinthills stakeholders in living drug free. We will do various activities and have dress-up days that correlate to the theme as a way to teach prevention. 
