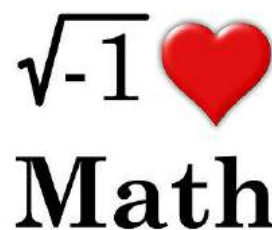


MATH RELAYS

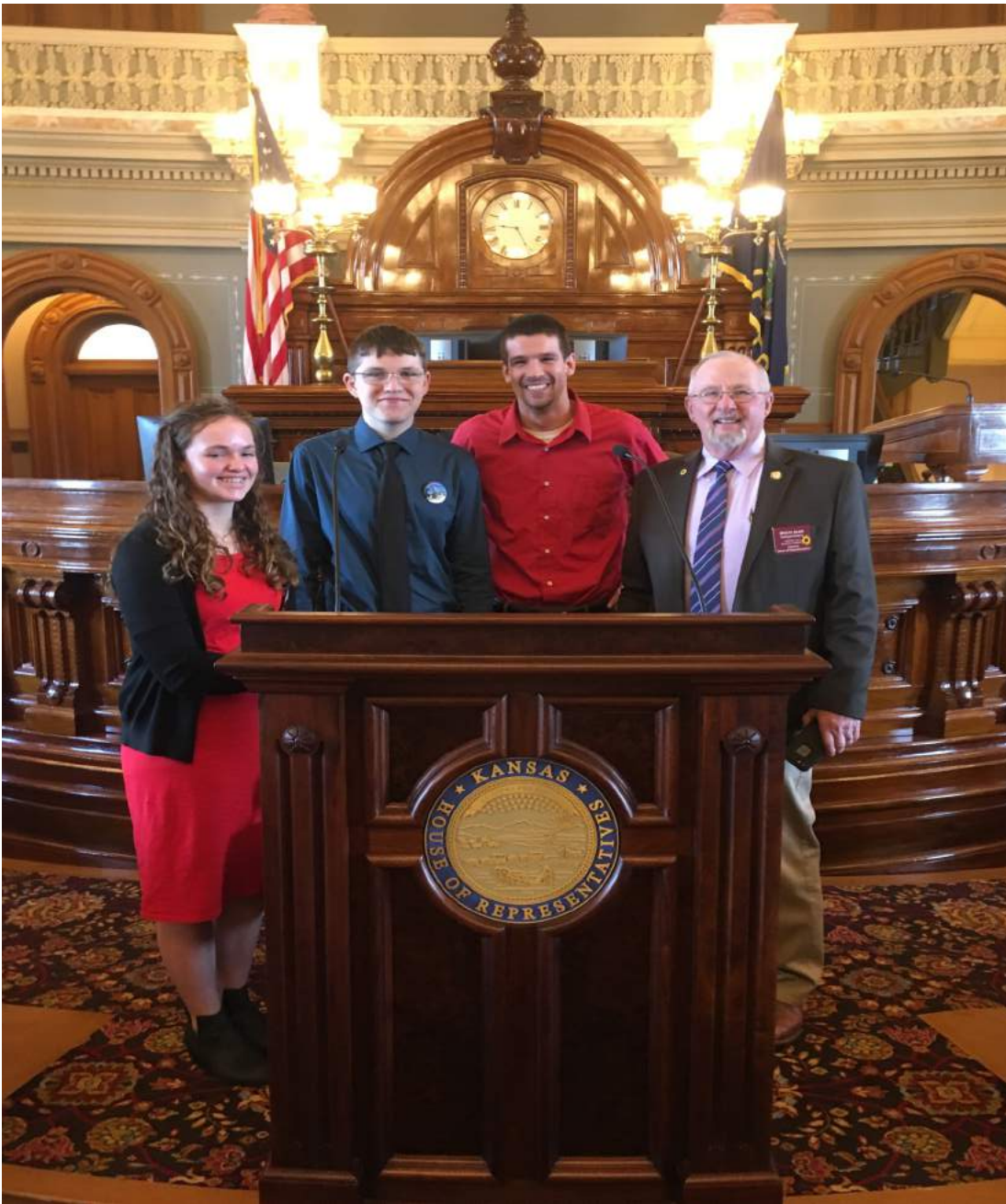

STUDENTS MEET GOVERNOR AND LEGISLATORS

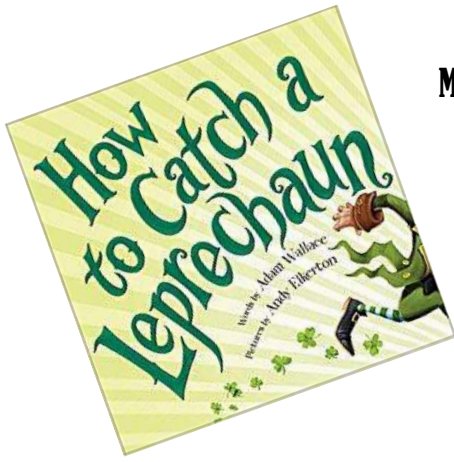
