Flinthills Hosts League Forensics

Friday, March 31st, the Flinthills Staff teamed together to facilitate the SCBL Forensics Tournament. They all wore a different hat that day to fill the roles of Judges, Timers, Hall Monitors, Concession Stand Workers, Hospitality Room Helpers, Registration and Judge's Table Facilitators and Event Draw Coordinators. Twenty-nine judges were required for this meet which accommodated 6 schools. Forensics competitions run much like a Track Meet. Students compete in individual events, yet the team's totals are calculated for sweepstake wins. Instead of students wearing athletic jerseys for sports, forensics students wear professional attire, much like the clothing required for job interviews.

Forensics prepares students for social, professional and leadership interactions in their future. Past students have emphasized how taking part in forensics better prepared them for successfully communicating while interviewing, leading groups, giving presentations, and holding engaging conversations with others. Events are in two major areas: Speaking and Acting. Students can compete in both or either area. Events are Informative Speaking, Persuasive Speaking, Impromptu Speaking, Extemporaneous Speaking, Dramatic and Humorous Solo Acting, Prose, Poetry, Improvised Duet Acting, and Duet Acting.

Our Flinthills team took 1st Place at the meet, with Oxford placing 2nd. Caldwell came in 3rd. Mustangs performed with mighty effort landing 5 more state qualified events assuring them a full 16 event team at State Championships this May! Many team members qualified their events for state at Clearwater, Medicine Lodge, Douglass and Lyndon this season. Nurse's Health Zone

A little less than 2 months and school will be ending for this school year. I hope everyone can remain healthy.

At the last board meeting, a couple of changes were made to some of the policies. All of these changes were made according to CDC guidelines. The question that always arises is "How long must I stay out of school after being sick?"

The first is a fever. The old guideline stated that a student had to remain out of school for 48 hours after their fever was below 100. The new guideline states 24 hours with a fever below 100 without any fever reducing medication such as Tylenol, Aspirin, or Ibuprofen, etc.

The next is strep. The old guideline stated that you had to stay at home for 24 hours after medication was started (an antibiotic). The new guideline is 12 hours after medication is started.

Also, in regards to vomiting and diarrhea, the guidelines state 24-48 hours after the symptoms have subsided.

With everything in bloom, bug bites, rashes and allergies are very common. I use Hydrocortisone cream for itching and reddened areas. Please give your child allergy meds if this is a common problem for them, since we do not give any type of allergy medication except for Benadryl. As most of you know, this medication can make the student very sleepy and unable to function at school.

TSA Earns Chance for National Competition

Four TSA members competed at the State Competition in Salina the last week of March. Two returning members, Adley Humig and Amanda Brown, were also state officers, so they spent non-competition time assisting with the conference, running opening ceremony, business meetings and awards ceremony. New members at state were Taylor Sutton and Shane Steinhauer.

Adley, our senior member and chapter president (along with state secretary), created an incredible children's book. While she didn't break into finals this was not a reflection on the quality of her work. Her book on "What is STEM" included pop ups, pull tabs and a project complete with supplies. Amanda competed in Architectural Design. We knew it was going to be a tight competition when we saw the paperwork from the opposition compared to the quality of Amanda's building model. Amanda walked away with a strong second place, along with a desire to pursue Architecture as a future career. Taylor Sutton's competition piece was to create an outfit for the Oscars in Fashion Design. Inspired by nature and mentored by Adley (who had competed in Fashion Design last year), Taylor modeled her outfit and interviewed well, walking away with 3rd place. Shane competed in Photography with a theme of The Elements. He didn't break into finals, but got a lot of experience which will benefit him next year!

Taylor and Amanda decided to try Forensic Science. They had to take a test to qualify to compete. They scored high enough to enable them to go into a "crime scene" where they looked for clues to solve the robbery. They worked well as a team and earned 5th place!

All four team members competed in On Demand Video. This competition gave them the prompt "Now go hit it out of the park" and to include a cell phone, laptop, and doorknob, along with 10 seconds of greenscreen in a 60 second humorous video. They chose to focus on idioms. Their video will be displayed on the school webpage. They didn't place in the top 5 but during the open viewing their video was well received.

Adley, Amanda and Taylor will be competing in Louisville, Kentucky with their qualifying competitions this summer.
