## Music Bridges Generations

## From the Desk of Superintendent, Brian Spencer

Although I have been here nearly three months now, my wife, Angela, had not been through the school since 2010 when we were here for a volleyball tournament. Prior to that she had not been in the facilities since we moved away. I imagine her response was like what most people who have been away for a while and then return say when they visit, "Wow, what great facilities!" When I visit with people from outside this area and share that I am working at Flinthills, if they have been by the school, they almost always say something about how nice the school looks. I share that to let you know that we have great facilities here at Flinthills, and others notice them.

As someone who knows how difficult it is to add and then maintain new facilities I want the patrons and property owners of the district to know how much our facilities and improvements are appreciated. The commitment of the "Flinthills Faithful" doesn't stop at paying taxes, though. The commitment throughout the district is much deeper than that. We have people that support our students through fundraisers, donations, volunteering and simply attending events and activities. The community support here is fantastic, and I am able to share that is not the situation in every district. We have great support here in the district, and it is appreciated.

Although the community support is appreciated, it is difficult to share that appreciation with patrons. However, at their September meeting, the Board of Education came up with a great way to show the district's appreciation to the Flinthills Faithful. They approved providing "Courtesy Passes" for the 2023-2024 school year. These passes will grant free admission to all regular season athletic events held in the district this year! All the district asks in return is that people identify how they are connected to the Mustang family. Are they parents, grandparents, patrons, employees, or something else? In exchange for that information, individuals are issued a red Courtesy Pass to be used for regular season home athletic events.

This idea came about while discussing the topic of raising gate fees. The South Central Border League (SCBL) is requesting member schools raise admission prices by a dollar, making it $\$ 4.00$ for students and $\$ 5.00$ for adults at middle school games, and $\$ 5.00$ and $\$ 6.00$ at high school games. The discussion led to the decision to invite our own people to attend games in our facilities to watch their kids compete at no cost! This was not an easy decision actually. The gate receipts are used to offset the cost of the officials and other expenses involved with hosting events. We anticipate we will lose about $\$ 13,000$ from this decision, but the board feels this is a noticeable way to let our patrons know we appreciate their support.

If you do not have your Courtesy Pass yet simply contact one of the offices at the school, and we will be sure you receive one. I will also tell you that you are Not Required to use a Courtesy Pass! You are welcome to continue to pay admission at each game. It made me smile when I learned that someone gave the school a $\$ 20$ donation when they entered the Homecoming Football game to say, "Thank you" for the Courtesy Passes! That is the sort of support that led the board to implement the Courtesy Passes!

Flinthills Faithful, thank you for your support. You are the reason it is a great time to be a Flinthills Mustang!

I know most of us are struggling with finances and the rising cost of everything. I spoke with a representative from Grace Med who may be able to help out some of our families with medical and dental issues. There are $\mathbf{1 2}$ clinics
in Wichita that are affiliated with Grace Med. They bill according to your insurance. Uninsured families are charged on a sliding scale based on your household income. I do have brochures that explain their services in more detail. I will have them available to families at the Parent-Teacher Conferences in October.

The cold and flu season is rapidly approaching. RSV (Respiratory Syncytial Virus) also is on the rise. Usually, you hear of babies and young children having this illness, but it can affect adults. The most common symptoms of RSV are runny nose, fever, cough, short periods without breathing, trouble eating, drinking or swallowing, wheezing, flaring of the nostrils or straining of the chest or stomach while breathing and breathing faster than usual or trouble breathing.

RSV usually lasts from 2 to 8 days and you usually just have to treat the symptoms. If a student is taken to the doctor, they may do a nasal swab test to determine if your child has RSV or another virus. A Chest X-ray may also be done. Antibiotics are usually not given since it is a virus.

Students infected with RSV are usually contagious for 3-8 days. There is no way to tell if your child is still contagious. A good rule of thumb is that they
can return to school once they have had no fever for at least 24 hours (without fever reducing medication), they are eating and drinking well and the cough may be present but is no longer frequent or distressing. Students should stay home from school when they do not feel well or are contagious.

## Flinthills Wins Homecoming Over Udall

The high school football team overcame rain, injury, and the excitement of homecoming festivities on Friday night against Udall. The Mustangs displayed grit and toughness to pick up their first win of the season, winning the game 26-18. The win moves Flinthills to $1-2$ on the season as they avenge a $50-0$ loss in Udall from last season. They have now won three out of the last four games against Udall after Friday night's win.

Udall started the game strong, as well, taking the ball from their own 15 -yard line the full length of the field, culminating in a 36-yard touchdown pass. Flinthills would respond quickly after a failed onside kick gave them the short field. Senior quarterback Tate Leslie would find Levi Beard with the 16-yard touchdown pass. Just a few plays later, defensive lineman Mason Randall picked up a fumble at the 11-yard line and rumbled into the endzone for a 12-6 lead.

The Mustangs defense would step up yet again, forcing another fumble and an interception by Conner Sigg. Flinthills was able to capitalize with a 4 -yard touchdown run by senior Wyatt Osborne. Osborne was a work horse all night for the Mustangs, carrying the ball 22 times for 165 yards and a pair of touchdowns.

Udall was not going to go quietly, though, despite a 18-6 halftime deficit. Udall would find the end-zone again with a 44 -yard run to start the second half scoring. Osborne would respond with a 42 -yard touchdown run of his own for Flinthills to grow the lead to 14 with under 8:00 to go in the fourth. Flinthills would milk off the games final four minutes on their way to the first win of the year.
