

MS FOOTBALL 14-0-Two YEARS UNDEFEATED!

What a great start to the JH Boys Athletics this year. With ten 7th grade boys and thirteen 8th grade boys, we fielded the largest team, number of players wise, since 1998. Grades and behavior in and out of school was a point of emphasis all season. We, as a coaching staff, believe that if you cannot do what is expected of you in school, how can you do what is expected on the field? These kids did just that for the most part. We did have

a few issues that, hopefully, the entire team learned what to do and what not to do and that there are consequences for grades and behavior.

The season was loaded with excitement. Our first 4 games were against the bottom 4 teams in the standings, and we got all players on

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a 26-8 victory over the Outlaws. This took us to 5-0 on the season and a matchup with Central of Burden, also 5-0.

We started out well against the Raiders and took a lead into halftime at Burden. The 2nd half, led by their quarterback's rushing abilities, managed to make the most exciting Junior High football game they have seen. With about 2 minutes to go in the game, Central scored a TD to bring

> the score to 26-27. Flinthills with a 1 point lead. The Mustang defense stepped up and kept the 2 point conversion attempt out of the end zone. Flinthills first needed а down to run Cenout tral of timeouts, but on a toss play to Garrett Jackson, he broke a tackle and went the distance

to score making it 33-26. We went for 2 but failed, and this left time for Central to come back. Central put a quick drive together and with 33.3 seconds left scored and converted the 2 point attempt to take a 34-33 lead. I remember looking at the clock and instead of talking about what we did wrong on that drive and conversion, I simply looked at them and said "Make sure we recover the kick and we have time". Coach Kemp had worked some Pistol Offense in and we moved Jackson to quarterback and ran sweeps with Cory Wells and Kaleb Grunder leading the way.

the field quite a bit. Several times you would see us rotating 8 kids on and off the field or having a completely different 8 on special teams to give kids a solid breather. The first 4 games saw us win by at least a 3 touchdown margin and allow us to get other kids that game time experience for next year whether it be with us as 8th graders or with the high school team as freshmen.

Letter from Mr. Spencer, the Superintendent....

Other than raising children, being involved in Honor Flight is the most meaningful thing I have ever done. For those who don't know, Honor Flight is a national program that was started by Early Morse, a Physician's Assistant in Springfield, OH back in 2005. This was shortly after the WW II Memorial had been completed; Earl and his father took four WW II veterans to Washington D.C. to see the new memorial in their small Cessna airplanes. That maiden trip laid the foundation for the nation-wide organization that exists today.

I became aware of Honor Flight in 2007 and, subsequently, developed the first Honor Flight -Student Edition in the country. Lyndon High School Student Guardians took 35 WW II Veterans to Washington D.C. on November 7, 2007. It was a whirlwind one day trip that left us all exhausted but joyful. Lyndon has been taking Honor Flights regularly since then, and several other schools in the state have begun doing them as well. I am excited to share with you that Flinthills is joining that list.

We have identified Student Guardians and are planning our first trip, which is scheduled for April 21 and 22 next spring. We have been invited to join other schools on a joint trip. We will be traveling with Central Heights, Lyndon, Prairie View, Osawatomie, and Northern Heights High Schools. Teaming up with other schools allows the veterans to enjoy the camaraderie of a large group while relieving the fund raising and organizational burdens of one school.

An Honor Flight usually consists of 56 people because that is how many people can ride in a charter bus. The cost of an Honor Flight from Kansas for 56 people is approximately \$45,000! That is a significant amount of money for one school to raise, and the planning and logistics involved is a large undertaking. Teaming up has allowed several schools to get involved that would not have been able to get started on their own. Flinthills is an example of that. We have been granted thirteen seats in the group. (This will be a large group of 112 people. We are going to fill two buses in Washington D.C.)

Six Student Guardians have been selected, and they will each accompany one local veteran; one sponsor will go as well. By the time you read this, we will likely have identified the veterans, but our hope is the program will grow, and in the future we will have more seats available which will allow us to honor more of our veterans. Although we have identified some veterans associated with our guardians and the school for this initial trip, we have posted a Veteran's Application on the school web page. If you, or someone you are associated with, are interested in receiving an Honor Flight, please complete that application and submit it to me. We will create a waiting list and work through the list as quickly as possible. We often have veterans unable to make the trip at the last minute, and if we have a waiting list, we can usually fill that vacant spot.

The veterans are presented with their Honor Flight at no expense to them. They paid their price long ago with their service to our country. No district funds will be used to pay for this trip, which means the student guardians and those associated with the group will have to raise the funds necessary for the trip. The cost of this trip is anticipated to be approximately \$750 per person. That means we need to raise around \$10,000. That is a significant amount of funds to raise by April!

Raising funds is important to the program obviously, but it is not the goal of the program. The goal is to have our youth represent their generation by selflessly serving aging heroes on a tribute opportunity of a lifetime. That means we will accept funds by any means necessary. We will not simply try to raise the funds with traditional fundraising techniques; we are also open to ideas like seeking sponsorships and grants. Donations from patriotic Americans have been the secret of the success of the Honor Flight program. If you would be willing to donate to the cause, please contact me. If your group or organization is interested in sponsoring a Veteran, please contact me. If you would like to get involved and help us be successful, please contact me.

You will be hearing more about Honor Flight and our fundraising efforts over the next few months. We are just getting started with a program that has potential to be life altering for veterans and guardians. We hope the Flinthills Faithful will get behind our efforts.

Our school district has several life saving devices or medications, which, although we hope we never have to use them, it is comforting to know they are available. We have the AED (life saving defibrillator), Epinephrine for a severe allergic reaction, Narcan for an overdose of an opioid, and we have now obtained a device called the Dechoker. It helps a victim when they are choking, after the Heimlich and back blows have been tried and the object is not removed. All staff have been trained on how to use this device and when to use it.


Letter from Mr. Hunter, the Middle/High school Principal....




HS Football and Senior Card Signing



The team rotated many players around on defense for Coach Kemp and they had only given up 34 points in the first 5 games. All of this would never be possible without the help of our community. Thank you for always being supportive and helping our district thrive. #MustandProud!!!








Book Fair Was A Success!
