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### From the Desk of Superintendent Brian Spencer

One of the toughest decisions I face each month is choosing a topic for the *Flinthills Flyer!* Sometimes the choice is easy, but most months it is difficult to narrow the scope and write about something pertinent to everyone in the district. This is one of those months. We have gotten settled into a new routine and the happenings in the district are likely covered by others who are writing articles. My options for a topic are wide open. I simply need to make a decision and write the article.

Most people are likely surprised to read that choosing a topic for the newsletter is one of the toughest decisions I make, and hopefully you don't believe that! There are many, many more important decisions than that involved in being a superintendent! I am often asked about the biggest challenges facing schools or even what are the most pressing issues in the district? The answers I gave to those types of questions twenty years ago are different from the answers I give most often in 2024. It used to be finances, facilities, or even transportation of students. Now the answer is hiring certified teachers!

Back in the 90's when I first became an administrator, it was common to simply place an advertisement in the local newspaper for an elementary school teacher and receive over twenty applications. Additionally, it was unusual to hire local students right out of college because you wanted them to have experience prior to "coming home to teach". Now, schools advertise in a much wider geographic area, - Actually with the internet, when we post a job to some sites it is shared across the country and even outside our borders to placement agencies all around the world - and we receive less applications. Honestly, I have not received twenty applications for any teaching position in the last decade! There is a teacher shortage. That is my response to the question of what is the biggest issue facing education.

Now schools hope to entice young people to "come home to teach" right out of college because they are connected to the area. Often the biggest factor to hiring a new teacher is if there is a family connection to the area. When people are given the opportunity to come back home, they will often take it. There are openings all over for teachers, so they can choose where they want to work and live. Many will choose to go home if there is an opportunity.

Additionally, not long ago the only way to become a teacher was to spend four or five years in college, student teach, and then apply for the license. Nowadays, there are several alternative pathways that can lead to becoming a teacher. A college degree is still ultimately required to get full certification or licensure, but often the course work can be completed while the applicant is working in the district. Additionally, there are people that have a degree in some area, but never took education courses or training, that decide they may want to become a teacher. These people can be placed right away, and receive a license in a short amount of time. It has been fun to see some "non-traditional" teachers come into the teaching profession this way and find success. If you or someone you know has a degree, and are thinking teaching would be a good career change, or maybe a great thing to do after retiring, it is much more possible than ever before.

Now, this doesn't always work. A beginning teacher works longer and harder than the average person realizes! Taking college classes while one is a beginning teacher really tests one's stamina and ability to organize and prioritize. It isn't for everyone, and as we all know, not everyone is meant to be a teacher. Sometimes it simply doesn't work out, but in the current educational climate, schools are willing to take that risk and help give people the chance to be teachers.

So, Mustang Faithful, I need help with my decision making process. Encourage your family and friends that would make good teachers to seriously consider it, especially if they are interested in returning to the area, and even if they have not completed any teacher training. We may have a position for them here in the future, or there will be a position in the surrounding area for them. - Or, you can send me a suggestion for next month's *Flyer* article!

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






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

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### Flinthills Football Making News

#### Flinthills vs Central Burden—September 6, 2024

Flinthills sophomore quarterback Charles Farris was less than a month old the last time the Mustangs got a win against Central Burden Raiders. In fact, every member of the Flinthills football team was still several years away from even starting kindergarten in 2008, the last time they had beat the Raiders. That made Friday night, the opening night of high school football, even more special in Rosalia as the Mustangs ended their losing streak taking the 24-12 win. "I challenged these boys back in May to be more intentional in the weight room this summer" Flinthills Coach Chase Casteel said. "You are here, so make it count. We are an extremely young team, but we are a hungry team and we just put it all together tonight." The sense that something might be happening started early in the game. After the teams traded turnovers on downs, Flinthills was able to get the first sustained drive by either team, which culminated in a 12-yard touchdown run by Farris. The quarterback would account for all three of Flinthills touchdowns on the night, two rushing and a 35-yard touchdown pass to Hunter Davis. "It felt amazing," Farris said of the win. "We pushed as hard as we could and we got the win and it felt amazing." Central was able to keep the game in doubt early, answering Flinthills early touchdown with one of their own. Freshman quarterback Treighton Hafenstein, who is tasked with replacing former Central allstate quarterback and current Friends University Falcon Jace Wunderlich, tied the game up with a 2-yard touchdown run of his own. An injury to Hafenstein early in the second half allowed the Mustangs to build their lead as the Raiders offense struggled. Farris would snag his second rushing touchdown early in the second quarter to hang on to a 14-6 halftime lead. A safety by the Mustangs to start the second half and the long pass to Davis, would push the lead to 24-6 by the end of the third quarter. It was just a matter of waiting out the clock at that point. Central was able to get into the endzone again, late in the 4th quarter, as back-up quarterback Hunter Henderson dove for the 1-yard touchdown. But it was too little too late as the Mustangs held on for the win. Depth and desire won out for Flinthills to open this season, and Coach Casteel seems excited about what's in store. "We have 39 boys out on an 8-Man football team," Casteel said. "We only have 49 boys in the whole school. 39 of them were on our sideline tonight and only four are seniors." Central-Burden, without any returning starters from last year, had only 16 in uniform to start the game. The game had plenty of miscues, with penalties adding up, errant snaps, and multiple turnovers by both teams. The task for Casteel and Farris is to clean that up as they prepare for week two. "Execution is a big thing for me," Casteel said. "If you do your job, the guy next to you can trust that he just has to do his job. That's what we've been working on since May. You are expected to do your job." Farris echoed his coach's thoughts. "We have to come to practice Monday ready to work and get everything done we need to get done," Farris said. "Watch film, get all the little things done and the little mistakes fixed." At least for the night, getting the first win against Central Burden in 5,803 days is worth celebrating. The excitement within Flinthills Mustang football is growing. "This is where Flinthills High School becomes a program." Casteel said. "The community is behind us, the student body is behind us, and we have things going in the right direction."











#### Flinthills vs. Sedan—September 20

SEDAN, Kansas — Winning on the road in the South Central Border League is never easy and for Flinthills, that task was monumental since they had never beat Sedan before.

Keyword: had.

Flinthills used a heavy power running game in the second half and knocked off the Blue Devils, 32-30, earning their first win in school history against Sedan. Previously, Flinthills was 0-9 against Sedan.

"I'm so proud of how hard our guys worked," Flinthills head coach Chase Casteel said. "Our entire staff and players bought in and it showed."

Something junior Levi Beard said sank in as well. He told the team at halftime to run the ball behind him and that's what coach Casteel and team did, getting under center and trusting their captain.

The win moves Flinthills to 2-1 for the first time since 2007 when they started 3-0 and finished the season 7-3.



It looked tough early as Sedan quarterback, Bryce Dickens was able to run away from the Flinthills defense with his scrambling ability. He turned some losses into gains and eventually ran in the game's first score with 6:33 remaining in the first quarter.

The Mustangs would respond immediately on the next possession, scoring on a 3-yard run by sophomore Charles Farris. It was junior Colton Reust who helped spur the drive as he was giving Tripp Carney a breather. He broke off a couple of runs, leading to Farris' keeper up the middle for the score but were unable to get the 2-point conversion but pulled within 8-6 with seconds to go in the first quarter.

Flinthills was able to capitalize on a bad hand off by Sedan, recovering a fumble as Sedan tried to run a jet sweep but a high snap messed up the timing and the Mustangs were ready to pounce. Sophomore Luke Jenkins was the first on the ground to give Flinthills good field position.

However, a big penalty behind the play put the Mustangs behind the sticks, forcing them to punt. The punt was a line drive that landed right in the arms of Sedan's Curtis Smilko, who was able to return it deep into Flinthills territory, setting up a big drive. Sedan would capitalize as Dickens found Paul Austin crossing in the back of the end zone with 49 seconds remaining in the half to take the 16-6 lead.

The Mustangs would have the final say of the half as Farris found a streaking Ty Finley behind his defender and was hit in stride and it gave Flinthills the momentum they needed.

The Mustangs pulled within 16-12 at halftime.

After Sedan pushed their lead to double digits, Flinthills kept their cool and did what they set out to do in the second half and that's run the dang football. They put Farris under center and just trusted their hard work would pay off.

"We trust our guys up front," Casteel said. "We just put our faith in them and the way they were able to move us down the field was huge."

They were gifted a huge present when a bad snap forced Sedan to punt on the run and it went for minus-3 yards, giving the Mustangs the ball at the 21-yard line of Sedan with 4:12 to go in the third.

Two plays later it was senior Noah Lacy carrying defenders on a zone run for a 19-yard run and pulled Flinthills within 22-18 with 3:18 remaining in the third.

The Mustangs weren't done as they forced a quick 3-and-out and it was Finley making his mark once again. This time, returning a punt to the house. He took a 62-yard punt, bobbing and weaving through the Sedan defense for the touchdown and giving Flinthills their first lead of the game, a 26-22 lead with 1:53 remaining in the third.

Sedan seemed like they were going to find a way to steal this game as a bad snap went into the end zone and Flinthills tried to scoop it up and ran but missed the ball and it was Sedan's Taylor Draper falling on it in the end zone for the touchdown. Sedan then ran Ethan Zimmerman running in the try to make it 30-26 with 8:38 remaining in the game

Parker Sutton put Flinthills in striking distance, returning the ensuing kickoff deep into Blue Devil territory. Then, it would only take one play for Lacy to slice down the left side, in front of the Sedan bench and put the Mustangs back on top, 32-30 with 8:16 remaining. Now defensive coordinator Jon Dunbar got his defense to lock in for the final eight minutes of the game. After a penalty put Sedan inside the Mustang 10-yard line, the defense came to finish out the game. First, it was a blown up, 3-yard loss on a run. Then, Carney read the option right, forcing another loss.

After a mishandled punt gave the Blue Devils (1-2) the ball at the Flinthills 4-yard line with 2:31 remaining, the defense stood tall once again. Junior Jacob Kine had a deflection on first down, followed by an open field tackle by Carney, who had Dickens 1-on-1 and made the play.

The defense had power rushed the backfield, blowing up the read option on third down. Then, on fourth down it was a host of Mustang defenders that stopped Sedan at the 1-yard line with 1:32 remaining.

The Mustangs finished with 177 yards rushing, including 68 yards—all in the second half—from Lacy to go along with his two scores. Flinthills only threw the ball five times in the second half but finished with 65 as a team.

Carney finished with 84 yards on 19 carries and had tackle after tackle defensively. He led the Mustangs with seven, including three for loss.

Finley finished with 99 all-purpose yards for the freshman.

"We battled tough and we never quit tonight," Casteel said. "Hopefully, we can build on this and have a special season."

The Mustangs will now host new 8-man squad, Northern Heights. They're coming off a 32-6 win over Hartford. It is their first win since Sept. 11, 2020. Most of those came at the 11-man level. They've already pick up a win in their first three games as an 8-man squad. "We're focused on each opponent each week," Casteel said. "We're not going to take anyone lightly. Each week, we go 1-0 and that's all we're worried about."




